<p>Worked collaboratively with others <i>Collaboration can be shown in many different activities, such as team sports, playing music in a band, or helping in a kindergarten. <p>Considered the ethical implications of their actions <i>Ethical decisions arise in almost any CAS activity (for example, on the sports field, in musical composition, in relationships with others involved in service activities).
